


Pastor Mary Fontaine, The Presbyterian Church in Canada

Bishop Noël Simard, Catholic Bishop of Valleyfield, Québec

Bishop Simard was ordained a priest on May 28, 1972, and ordained Auxiliary Bishop at Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, on October 3, 2008. Until his appointment as bishop, he was a professor of moral theology and bioethics at Saint Paul University, Ottawa. Bishop Simard is currently Bishop of Valleyfield and President of the Quebec Assembly of Catholic Bishops.

Marie Wilson spent over three decades building an illustrious career in journalism before becoming one of three commissioners of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada (TRC). Ms. Wilson currently sits on the Board of Directors of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation (CBC-Radio-Canada) and the Rideau Hall Foundation. As a prominent public speaker throughout Canada and internationally, she brings acknowledged expertise on the successes and challenges of advancing reconciliation.
